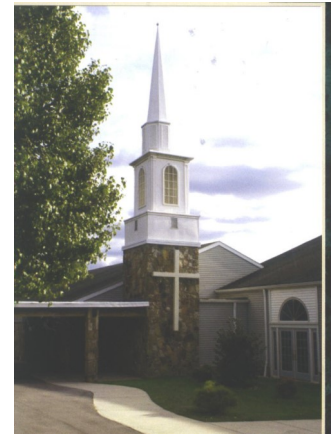


# The Messenger

Fairfield Glade Community Church



Dear Friends in Christ,

One of the traditional signposts for the month of February is Valentine's Day on the 14th. Stores are already packed with candy and flowers wrapped in red and pink. Approximately 150 million Valentine's Day cards are exchanged annually, making Valentine's Day the second most popular card-sending holiday after Christmas.

Valentine's Day was historically a celebration of romantic love. But nowadays Valentine's Day has expanded to celebrate not just romantic love, but all sorts of loving relationships, even puppy love among elementary age kids.

I remember in my elementary school creating and giving a Valentine's Day card to one of my classmates named Candy (Candace). The name fit her perfectly, as she was very sweet. I don't recall any romantic moments with her, but we sure giggled a lot together.

We know that not everyone is always involved in a romantic relationship when February 14th rolls around on the calendar. Valentine's Day cards and gifts are often shared between parents and their children, between friends, and others we love.

One of my favorite books about relationships is "The 5 Love Languages," by Gary Chapman. He originally wrote the book for marital relationships, but he has since expanded to apply the 5 love languages to many other sorts of loving relationships.

The first love language he identifies is "words of affirmation." In our current culture, there often seems to be a growing competition for who can win at being most harsh, insulting, and condescending with their words. "Words of affirmation," on the other hand, are loaded with compliments, encouragement, kindness, and humility. Words of affirmation are not the same as verbal flattery in order to get something we want. That's called manipulation. Words of affirmation require empathy and seeing the world from the other person's perspective. This necessitates learning what is important to the other person. Only then can we give words of affirmation.

The second love language Chapman identifies is "quality time," which means giving someone our undivided attention. This is not always easy in our current culture that is filled with many distractions. According to Chapman, quality time includes quality conversation: "sympathetic dialogue where two individuals are sharing their experiences, thoughts, feelings, and desires in a friendly, uninterrupted context." This entails cultivating a safe place where there is a mutual exchange of both sympathetic listening as well as vulnerable self-disclosure.

The third love language is "receiving gifts." Chapman is referring specifically to something that is tangible, such that someone seeing it can say "he was thinking of me," or "she remembered me." The gift itself is a symbol of that thought. It doesn't matter whether the gift costs money. What is important is we thought of the person to whom we gave the gift. Chapman nevertheless points out that "it is not the thought implanted only in the mind that counts, but the thought expressed in actually securing the gift and giving it as the expression of love."

The fourth love language is “acts of service.” These are actions that we know someone would like us to do. Acts of service are not, however, because of manipulation by guilt and coercion. As Chapman rightly emphasizes, “no one likes to be forced to do anything. In fact, love is always freely given. Love cannot be demanded. We can request things of each other, but we must never demand anything. Requests give direction to love, but demands stop the flow of love.”

The fifth love language is “physical touch.” Whether a romantic kiss, a platonic hug between two longtime friends, or holding the hand of someone on their deathbed, we know firsthand the power of physical touch.

While all 5 love languages are part of the human experience, most of us prefer one or two love languages over the others. One person may not desire much physical touch but instead needs words of affirmation. Someone else may be just the opposite.

What is important is to discover our own primary love language(s) and let our loved ones know so they can more fully express love to us. Just as important is to find out the primary love languages of others in our lives so that we can be sure they know we love them by speaking their preferred love language.

Safe to say our world could use a little more love, but not just on Valentine’s Day.

## WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP MINUTES

### January 9, 2019

Page 6

Jamie Freels welcomed everyone and went around the table to have all introduce themselves. She then opened with a prayer and a devotion from "Melanie Shankle, a Blogger, entitled "Miracle of Friendship". Jamie asked everyone to participate in an "ice breaker" where everyone got up and introduced themselves to each other.

The minutes were read by Mary Zanichelli and the Treasurer's report was discussed by Judy Koskinen. The end of the year 2018 report shows the charities that received money along with the postage for the military boxes. The balance as of 12-31-18 was \$256.07. It was explained that all the local charities are in need of money and that only a few were also given money from Missions. We have \$1453.39 in savings that was for a retreat or some other project for our ladies in Women's Fellowship. The annual letter for the \$25.00 donation for WF will be going out to all women in the congregation. This is mostly used for the mission distributions at year end. Lilly Janecek made a motion to approve this letter and Nancy Burleson seconded the motion.

Nancy Burleson followed with the installation of officers: Jamie Freels, President; Kathryn Rydz, VP; Jan Gunter & Judy Koskinen, Co-Treasurers; Mary Zanichelli, Secretary.

**Old Business:** Compassion Meals are offered to those in need due to illness, loss of a loved one or other individual need on a limited basis. A sign-up sheet was passed around for those that could prepare a meal or part of a meal, and another sheet was passed for a monthly coordinator. This person would be called by the church office and be responsible for handling the request and getting the details of time/place/special dietary requirements. They would then either make part of the meal or ask those on the list to help. This is done for church members or regular attendees. Jamie will email this list to everyone. The issue of reimbursement was discussed and decided that if a large meal was needed, it could be paid out of our WF Treasury. As information, Resident Services also does "Meals on Wheels".

**New Business:** Jamie explained the survey results with a handout. Fellowship came out with the largest percentage of reason for attending 26%; Outings or projects for fun 23%; Informational programs 21% and Mission projects 17%.

Several outings were mentioned by Jamie as possibilities: The Manhattan Project in Oak Ridge; Civil War Tour (between Chattanooga and Crossville); Falcon Restaurant and Mansion Tour in McMinnville (they offer a murder mystery with guest participation); Highland Winery in Jamestown; Lost Sea in Sweetwater; and Historic Rugby. A backstage tour of the Playhouse is another option.

Nancy Burleson explained several functions that are performed by WF members such as: Activity bags for children that visit the church; Baby items that are in the storage room for loaning out to anyone when grandchildren come to visit; Toiletries such as hotel size shampoos, soaps, etc. in basket on table in Fellowship Hall and taken to Avalon or the military boxes; Morgan Scott white bin in back hall for sanitary products and a large bin for household items/clothing/furniture etc. that are sold in the Morgan Scott store and used to repair low income houses or help the poor as needed. (Note-these items are taken by a driver the second Wed. of each month to Morgan Scott.) A Mission Project of WF in April is to carpool up to Morgan Scott Christian Project in Deer Lodge, TN and help sort out bulk seeds in baggies for distribution to local families to grow their own vegetables.

For our February 13<sup>th</sup> Valentine's Day Meeting, we can visit our church members residing at Good Samaritans and bring homemade cookies, candies and a flower along with a card to brighten their day and let them know we are thinking of them. We would meet at church to bag the cookies/candies first and carpool since parking is limited. More on this will be in the Messenger. A sign up will be on the bulletin board in the Fellowship Hall for all to sign up.

This was an outstanding meeting with several guests and lots of great ideas for 2019.

## Church Finances

The summary of the current income and expense status for 2018 through December 2018 is as follows:

Please keep in mind that the numbers above only reflect what has been brought in and spent in 2018.

**The overall take away from this information is that in 2018, our church spent \$15,603.89 more than we brought in. This difference was made up by spending financial reserves that have accumulated over past years. The good news is that we still have over \$119,000 in reserves even after this over-expenditure. Our preferred past practice has been to keep the equivalent of at least three months of expenses or about \$70,000 in reserve. Consequently, we are still in a good financial position.**

### **READ THE NOTES TO FULLY UNDERSTAND THE NUMBERS ABOVE!!!**

Notes:

1. The General Fund is the operating funds to run the Church. ***Note: The negative position in the General Fund is because of the transfers to Missions, Property Improvement, and the Strategic Planning projects.***
2. The Missions Fund income is from designated contributions from Church members, the sale of Food City Cash Cards, Kroger charity program contributions, and Dimes for Missions. Expenses are disbursements to charities and bank charges for counting coins. The transfer amount is the money moved from the General Fund to Missions as part of the budgeted Church support to Missions.
3. The Property Improvement Fund (PIF) income is from designated donations from church members. PIF expenses are any property and facility expenses not covered by day-to-day maintenance activity.
4. Pass-Thru Fund is to account for money that comes through the Church but is not used to cover Church expenses. It is primarily for items such as special disaster collections, NIN/Peacekeeping, One Great Hour of Sharing, Christmas Joy, Men's Fellowship, Women's Fellowship, etc. ***Note: The Pass-Thru Fund currently has a positive position but that will change when the money collected for Christmas Joy is disbursed to the two denominations in January.***
5. Transfer is the term used to move money from one fund to another fund. Transfers are generally from the General Fund to the Missions Fund and the Property Improvement Fund. For instance, money is transferred from the General Fund to the Missions Fund on a quarterly basis to meet the congregation approved budget for Missions.
6. Difference = Income – Expense + Transfers

A complete picture of all the assets of the Church (balance sheet), 2018 income and expenses, and 2018 budget status are posted on the Church Events Bulletin Board in the Fellowship Hall.

1. **Call to order and Opening Prayer:** Having declared a quorum, Jim Hansen called the meeting to order. Jim offered an opening prayer.
2. **Agenda review and revisions:** Al Joseph asked to add item j under new business: personnel changes for Nominating committee for 2019. Marty Smith suggested doing Old Business and New Business before Committee Reports to see if this would help reduce the time of the meeting. Jim agreed to give this a try.
3. **Approval of December Minutes:** Dennis Flynn moved to accept the minutes from the December 13<sup>th</sup>, 2018 meeting with the one change noted. Under Pastor James report, change the date on the second sentence from 2019 to 2018. Al Joseph seconded the motion and the minutes were approved as amended.
4. **Treasurer's report:** Marty Smith gave the yearend report on behalf of Michael Nowacki who is recovering from surgery: The report has been placed on file for audit. We are still in good shape financially. Item b under New Business will cover a transfer from General Fund to Property and Facilities.
5. **Membership Report:** Jim Hansen: As of January 10<sup>th</sup> we have 254 members and we have received 89 pledges so far totaling \$181,700.00.
6. **Pastor's Report:** Pastor James: He will be on vacation Jan. 21-30 to Texas. Rev. Skipworth be the interim minister.

**Old Business**

- a. Jim Hansen gave an update on the Emergency Response Team. There are currently 9 people who have expressed interest in the ERT committee. A 4 person sub-set of this group is working on developing a plan for going forward. The next meeting of the larger group will be on January 22<sup>nd</sup> to go over plan.
- b. Discussion was held on the next steps for the 2019 Contracts. All of the contracts for 2019 have been submitted to Jim. Marty moved that Jim sign contracts as already submitted, pending approval of budget on Jan. 20. If the budget is adjusted due to Congregational action on January 20<sup>th</sup>, Jim will send out an email with changes for board approval. John Zanichelli seconded the motion. Motion carried.
- c. Discussion was held on the current Facilities Use Permit. The Title of form for other groups who meet at church should be changed to reflect current use. Several other sections must be changed to reflect current use. Office Manager will be tasked with making changes. On the second page of this form there are 6 bulleted items just before the signature lines. The second to the last line states, "A contribution to help defray church expenses is appreciated". Roy moved to move this line to the last line of this section, just before the signatures and put this line in bold. Al Joseph seconded the motion and the motion carried. On the Guidelines page, bold the second bulleted item under "Avoid Liquid Spills".

**New Business**

- a. Jim handed out the Board Member assignments for opening and closing prayers for the remainder of the 2019 Board Meetings.
- b. Review and act on recommendation from Finance for transfer of funds. Marty Smith moved to move \$4879.88 from General Fund to Property and Facilities. Roy Koskinen seconded. Motion carried.
- c. Review discussion from Finance concerning internet provider contract. Dennis will be discussing this with Technology & Communications (Ron) to get this resolved.

- d. Review and act on recommendation from Finance for year-end bonus based on 2018 financial status. Susan Milledge moved to approve the employee bonus as recommended by Finance Committee and Personnel Committee. Marty Smith seconded the motion. Motion carried.
- e. The Finance Committee recommends that the final payment to Hammond Church Interiors be made from the checking account rather than the Reserve Fund. With excess funds in the checking as explained by Marty, the Board agreed to this change.
- f. Review and act on Facilities Use Permit. Roy Koskinen moved to accept the proposal from Bluebird House Monitors Club for a one-time use of Fellowship Hall. Nancy Nowacki seconded the motion. Motion carried.
- g. Review and act on request from Jerry Allard for Board members to serve Communion. Marty Smith moved we serve Communion any two months that Jerry Allard decides. Al Joseph seconded motion. Motion carried.
- h. Review and act on request from both the Men's and Women's Fellowship's. Roy Koskinen moved to approve the Men's Fellowship and Women's Fellowship Solicitation Letters be sent out to include members and regular attendees. Fred Wong seconded. Motion carried.
- i. Jim discussed important dates for Board members for January.
- j. Review and act on accepting John Zanichelli resignation from the Nominating Committee because he is now a member of the Board. Jim Oswald has volunteered to fulfill the rest of John's term. Al Joseph made the motion. John Zanichelli seconded. Motion carried.
