

Dear Friends in Christ,

"Are there any of you who are wise and understanding? You are to prove it by your good life, by your good deeds performed with humility and wisdom. But if in your heart you are jealous, bitter, and selfish, don't sin against the truth by boasting of your wisdom. Such wisdom does not come down from heaven; it belongs to the world, it is unspiritual and demonic. Where there is jealousy and selfishness, there is also disorder and every kind of evil. But the wisdom from above is pure first of all; it is also peaceful, gentle, and friendly; it is full of compassion and produces a harvest of good deeds; it is free from prejudice and hypocrisy. And goodness is the harvest that is produced from the seeds the peacemakers plant in peace."

The above quote is from the Bible, in the Letter of James, chapter 3, verses 13-18. You'll notice that I highlighted the word "understanding."

Understanding, or not understanding, often makes a huge difference in our individual daily lives and on a global scale.

The understanding we now have of the human physical body is astounding, especially when compared to 2,000 years ago during the time of Jesus walking on the Earth.

I often hear of medical procedures that members of our congregation are undergoing that are mindboggling at the depth of

understanding about blood, bones, organs, and other material inside of us.

Yet with all our profound understanding, which continues to advance in many aspects of life, we often still experience a lack of understanding, a mis-understanding, neglect understanding, or refuse understanding. These lead to many problems, some of which are minor, and some of which are catastrophic.

How many marital relationships fell apart in large part from problems with understanding each other? How many work environments became toxic and dysfunctional due to an underlying issue with understanding one another? How many wars were started because of how groups of people had an understanding of each other that was not the kind of wise understanding "from above" that is "peaceful, friendly and gentle?"

Understanding another person can often be complicated. We are not carbon copies. Each person has individual beliefs, experiences and backgrounds, making it difficult to fully understand.

The reality is that I can't fully understand someone. I can't fully understand my wife, my parents, our kids, and others I know extremely well. I can't even fully understand myself.

But that shouldn't stop us from putting in the time and effort that is needed for understanding. Thank goodness medical professionals continue trying to gain more understanding of how they can diagnose and treat the diseases and illnesses that still cause serious problems, such as cancer and Parkinson's, just to name two.

How motivated are we in understanding another human being? How motivated are we in understanding ourselves?

As Christians, as members of Community Church, we turn to the Spirit of Jesus Christ for understanding other human beings, and ourselves, all of whom are made in the image and likeness of God.

"And we know that the Son of God has come and has given us understanding so that we may know him who is true; and we are in him who is true, in his Son Jesus Christ. He is the true God and eternal life" (1 John 5:20).

Our Faith Development group discussions are an opportunity for understanding "in him who is true," for we are the Body of Christ, Community Church.

In our church's Faith Development gatherings, we share not just knowledge about a subject matter, but our own personal experiences and backgrounds. We have a diversity in our congregation, a richness of wisdom. My hope and prayer is that we come to better understand others, and better understand ourselves, with an understanding that "is full of compassion and produces a harvest of good deeds; free from prejudice and hypocrisy. Goodness is the harvest that is produced from the seeds the peacemakers plant in peace."

How Do You Do.....

Here are the Buell's, Byron and Barbara. They arrived in the Glade in February 2005 and became members of Community Church in the fall of that year. Arriving from Rochester, N.Y. where they were members of a Presbyterian Church for many years. Barbara was born in Syracuse, N.Y. and Byron in Detroit, MI. He later moved to Upstate New York. They both went to the same high school, Barbara being ahead of him. They did not date, but got to know each other at church. Byron won a Navy scholarship to Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute where he studied Mechanical Engineering. During a midshipman cruise he sent her an embroidered



post card from Spain. That was the start of the romance which soon lead to their marriage. When Byron went to his executive officer to ask for leave to get married, he was told he was needed for the first inland waterways cruise of the Great Lakes by the Navy. Upon returning to home port in Newport, R. I. he was expecting a 10 day leave. Again it was denied because he had to attend damage control school in Philadelphia. He told Barbara he would meet her over a weekend so they could be married. It happened on Halloween, 59 years ago. They were blessed with a baby girl. She was born in the Newport Naval Hospital while Byron was on a six month deployment in the Mediterranean. She later became a school teacher in Cincinnati and is in her 36th year of teaching junior/senior high school special education.

Following active duty in the Navy, the Buell's moved to Rochester, N.Y. where Byron went to work for Kodak as a manufacturing engineer. He joined a Naval Reserve Unit supporting the Office of Naval Research and Naval Research Laboratory; he retired as a captain in 1984. He attended night school and received a MBA from the *Rochester Institute of Technology*. They had a two year assignment in Laredo, TX where Byron managed the assembly of Kodak cameras. After 30 years Byron retired from Kodak; he knew he couldn't just sit. He sold himself to a small molding firm where they specialized in precision plastic parts. In 2004 the Buell's took a trip to the Glade with some close friends who had just purchased a home. They were advised to "bring a checkbook" and in three days they bought a house.

Remaining active over time, they have ushered, greeted, etc. in church. Byron has been active in Men's Fellowship as well as community activities in the Peavine Care Center where Byron worked with the original founders, Lions Club, Habitat for Humanity for 15 years, and Cumberland County Playhouse. Byron's main activity in the Lions is coordinator of visual screening in the Cumberland County schools. Byron's hobbies include photography (no surprise after 30 years in Kodak), biking and hiking. He also has an extensive collection of antique photographic equipment, many pieces from Barbara and daughter.

His pearls of wisdom are many and wise. For new members, "there is lots of stuff to do, no reason not to be active"; if possible, look for ways to volunteer; meet and greet the neighbors, don't close the door; look for ways to do what you like to do, don't just sit back because you are retired. Byron had cards made when he retired, they said "I am renewed"; if you don't have a reason for being, you will fade away. All good advice for all....!

- 3. People use their gifts and talents to minister to one another.
- 4. Small group members encourage each other in their faith.
- 5. Small group members encourage each other to grow.
- 6. Group members hold each other accountable.
- 7. Members pray for one another.
- 8. People are more likely to practice what they learn.
- 9. Group members can help each other in hard times.
- 10. Friendships start in small groups.

Some level of these ten benefits have been realized in the successful small groups in our church, based on feedback that has been given to the Pastor and the Small Group Coordinator.

This is not to say all groups have been completely successful. Not all groups were able to meet regularly and not all members felt comfortable with the group to which they were assigned. The people in those groups have not given up on the reasons for Small Groups but moved to another group that was more well-matched to them.

- 1. <u>General Fund</u> is the operating funds to run the Church and consists of General Contributions from Church members. Expenses include Pastoral and Support Staff salaries; administrative costs for supplies; utilities, building and grounds maintenance; and church committees expenditures. The Difference shown in the General Fund is the result of the interest income earned via the United Church Fund Endowment and Reserve funds for the first quarter of 2019.
- 2. <u>Mission's Fund</u> income is from designated contributions from Church members, the sale of Food City Cash Cards, Kroger Charity Program contributions and Dimes for Missions and is used to support sixteen local charities. Mission's income for the month of April was \$231.21 (\$56.21 from Kroger and \$175.00 from Food City Cards). Expenses consisted of a special mission donation authorized by Pastor James. The Difference shows the result of income received as compared to expenses for the month of April only. The missions fund overall is not in a negative cash flow position.
- 3. **Property Improvement Fund (PIF)** income is from designated donations from church members. PIF expenses are any property and facility expenses not covered by day-to-day maintenance activity. There was a \$20.00 donation for property improvement for the month of April.
- 4. <u>Pass-Thru Fund</u> is to account for money that comes through the Church but is not used to cover any Church expense. Pass-Thru money for April consisted of income designated for the flower fund, the library, One Great Hour of Sharing, and a free will donation in support of the Plateau Women's Chorus concert totaling \$1,932.50. Expenses were for the Bell Choir, Easter plants, and free will donation disbursements to the Bread of Life Rescue Mission, Plateau Handbell Ringers and Plateau Women's Chorus. Total money disbursed via the Pass-Thru Fund was \$1,874.96. The Difference shows the result of Pass-Thru income received as compared to expenses for the month of April.
- 5. <u>Strategic Planning Projects.</u> There was no income for the month of April. Expenses consisted of an \$85.00 St. George Pavilion rental reservation fee to retain the Pavilion for an outdoor service that will be held is September. This is a fully funded Strategic Plan Initiative. \$350.00 has been allocated for this project.
- 6. **Transfer** is the term used to move money from one fund to another.

- Sunday, June 2 at 3pm at FFG Community Church Daryl Mosley singer /songwriter of gospel music will share his musical ministry.
